Salisbury 6 May 1780

I beg pardon for not answering your Letter before I assure you I was extremely concern'd to hear you had been so ill; but am happy to find that you are so far recover'd as to be able to write to me, for your kind Letters always give me pleasure, I hope you are now quite well and Mr Veale and Miss also, enjoy good health I sincerely wish you all a continuance of that blessing I have had a violent cold ever since my illness which has made me very deaf I cannot hear what any body says to me unless they speak very loud, but ^{the} warm weather will carry that off — I was indeed much surpris'd to hear of Mr Donaldsons being with Mr Woodro — I am glad to hear Mr Brown has met with such good Fortune, I hope Mr Bullcock has recover'd his illness — I am sorry to find Mr Veale is so much fatigued with business — I have had 2 parts in three of my money from Mr Coopers, but cannot get the remaining which is fifty pounds nor any interest for that — if I could should gladly have sent it to Mr Veale —
